


This week in assembly, in honour of World Wildlife Day, the children learned all about reptiles through the fascinating life story of Joan Procter. Joan was a

It has been lovely to see the children going into the hall at break times to pick a book. We are now considering how we can continue this on a smaller scale for the rest of the term.






# MAKING A DIFFERENCE TO THE BIRDS






# YEAR 5/6 GIRLS BUILD RESILIENCE: NEWCHURCH VS GODSHILL

# KEY DATES FOR 2025

The statutory Key Stage 2 tests are scheduled from **Monday 12 May to Thursday 15 May 2025**. It is crucial for all parents of children in **Year 6** to take note of these dates and ensure that students are present for these important assessments. Please avoid scheduling holidays or other commitments during this time.

In addition, **Year 4** will be undertaking a statutory **Multiplication Tables Check** in the summer term. Schools must administer the multiplication tables check within the 2-week period starting on **Monday 2 June 2025**.

Pupils in **Year 1** are required to take part in a **Phonics Screening Check**. Schools must administer the phonics screening check within the 1-week period starting **Monday 9 June 2025**.

These assessments are a fantastic opportunity for the children to demonstrate their hard work and understanding. It's their chance to shine and show how much they've learned.

#### CAN WE MAKE A DIFFERENCE?

Comic Relief will be celebrating the 40th anniversary of Red Nose Day on 21st March, only 2 weeks time!

The charity would like us to **'go big, give big and feel good together'** and to embrace this campaign we will be hosting our own 'Big Bake Week' starting on **Monday 17th March**.

We welcome any donations of cakes but would love to see some made either to support the red nose/funny theme or our theme of play to embrace children's games and pastimes. So please get creative—we have included a simple recipe from a previous Red Nose Day to help you so why not have a trial run this weekend?

The more cakes we have to sell over the week the more of a difference we can make to our children at playtime but also to national good causes!



#### Makes 12 cupcakes

#### YOU'LL NEED

- For the cakes
- 100g soft butter or margarine
- 150g caster sugar
- 2 large eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 150g self-raising flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 3 tbsp milk

#### For the decoration

- 150g icing sugar
- 2–3 tbsp water
- Glacé cherries or red sweets
- A tube of writing icing

#### MAKE THE CAKES

- Heat the oven to 180°C/160°C fan/gas mark 4 and line a 12 hole muffin tin with paper cases.
- Mix the butter and sugar together in a bowl until smooth and pale. Beat the eggs in a separate bowl then mix them into the butter and sugar, along with the vanilla extract.
- Gently fold in the flour and baking powder, adding the milk a little at a time until the mixture drops easily off a spoon. Dollop the mixture into the paper cases until they're about three-quarters full.
- Bake in the oven for 10–15 minutes, or until golden-brown on top and a skewer poked into one of the cakes comes out clean.
- Set aside in the tin for 5–10 minutes, then move your cakes to a wire rack to finish cooling.

#### GET DECORATING

- Sieve the icing sugar into a bowl and add the water a few drops at a time until the icing's smooth but still thick. (You don't want it running straight off your cakes.)
- Spoon some icing onto each cake and gently spread it towards the edges.
- Pop a cherry or sweet on top for a nose, then add eyes and a mouth with writing icing. Or get creative with your own design!

#### TOP(PING) TIP

Use lemon juice instead of water to give your icing a zingy twist.

#### CHOC TIP

Swap the vanilla extract for 20g of cocoa powder and a little extra milk to make your cupcakes chocolatey.



# SO HOW HAVE WE SETTLED IN?



This week Donaldson Class have been reading The Three Little Pigs. We have loved retelling the story and joining in with the repeated refrain in some very deep wolf voices. We have been busy role playing the story and have been building our own houses and dens in our outside area and have been looking out for the big bad wolf! In drawing club, we drew our own wolf and described them. Some of them were hairy, smelly villains and some of them were kind and fluffy heroes. In maths we have been comparing groups of objects and talking about who has

more, fewer and the same. We've also been thinking about how we could make it fair by adding more or taking some away. In circle time we have been thinking about who looks after us at home and how we can help look after our special people. There have been lots of promises to help our grown-ups tidy up!

Rosen class has had a super productive week! We have been continuing to work with numbers to 50, looking at the multiples of tens within 50 as well as ordering the numbers and finishing missing numbers. Throughout our history lessons we have started to look at Grace Darling and why she was the first woman to be awarded a medal for bravery at sea. The children were great at looking at pictures of when Grace Darling rescued people from a sinking ship and guessing what was happening and how long ago. In Science we have continued to look at plants and have been looking at the difference between bulbs and seeds. We have compared and sorted them, before dissecting them to see what is on the inside and then trying to label the different parts. As part of our careers week we

have been watching some short videos on different careers such as being a pilot, a potter or a baker. We also enjoyed an assembly by Rich Lloyd who spoke to us about working with a premier league football club.



This week, Year 2 has been very busy! In English, they continued reading Toby and the Great Fire of London, comparing London now and in 1666, and writing descriptive sentences based on pictures of the Great Fire. In Maths, they focused on multiplication, using groupings to write multiplication sums. In Science, they studied the lifecucle of plants, exploring different types of seeds and their similarities and differences. During phonics lessons, they learned about spelling rules for adding 'ing' to words with short vowels. The students also enjoyed lots of outdoor learning and play, taking advantage of the lovely afternoons in the sun.

In Wharton Class this week in Maths we have started our topic of length and perimeter. In English we have been looking at shape/concrete poetry to help us with ideas for our poem about the dark related to our reading book The Night Box. In Science we have been continuing to look at the properties of materials as well as looking at the viscosity of liquids. We had a lovely visit from a nurse at The Bay Medical Practice who used to attend Newchurch Primary School. She was able to tell us about the path she followed to enable her to become a nurse. In PSHE we have been looking at fact and opinion, we have talked about how people can see an event from a different viewpoint.





Angelou class have been working hard to master some very tricky concepts this week. Firstly, we looked at the present perfect tense in English. We learned about how we need an auxiliary verb to link with a past tense verb to show that an action that was completed in the past is still relevant today. We created our own magical object and imagined a scenario that this could have been used to get up to mischief before writing a howler to reprimand the character and had a go at including the present perfect tense. In maths, we learned about equivalent fractions and used a fraction wall to help us see which fractions were equivalent. We noticed a pattern and realised that we could

multiply the numerator and denominator by the same number to get an equivalent fraction. We then went on to use the highest common factor to simplify fractions. We concluded our electrical circuits unit in science by carrying out an investigation to see if increasing the voltage of a battery increased the brightness of a bulb. We made sure the test was fair and used a lux meter to measure the brightness before recording our results in a table. We were lucky enough to be visited by nurse Hannah, an ex Newchurch student, as part of careers week. She told us all about her job and also about some of the other jobs in the NHS. She brought along some of her equipment and let us have a go at listening to each others hearts, taking temperatures and putting on bandages. Mrs Illman even had her blood pressure taken!

Duffy Class have ventured on to a new topic in maths, this week. Decimals and percentages. Following on from our Yr 5 last topic on fractions, this will hopefully demonstrate to the class the close relationship between the three concepts. This week we have been looking at numbers to one and two decimal places and equivalent fractions. In English, we have looked at the story of the 'The Dam', from the little girl's point of view. We participated in some drama 'freeze frame' activities, acting out different stages in the story and then talking about how this made us feel. We then used these insights, to write a diary entry from the perspective of the young girl. We have also started our new history topic on 'The Anglo-Saxons'. We discovered when and where they came from and started to look at the impact they had on Britain. We also had a visit from Veronica from the RSPCA, our class chosen charity. She kindly came in to talk to us about how we can raise money for the charity, stories about the animals and even told us how she found herself working in the animal sector. We finished off the week with our Year 5 Showcase Assembly, showing off our brilliant work and skills.



This week, our Year 6 students have been busy with a variety of exciting activities! In English, they wrote instruction texts on how to "kill a Blucher" (a fun creative challenge), while in Maths, they began exploring line graphs and statistics. In Design Technology, the children made healthy pancakes using bananas and vanilla as substitutes for sugar. They also designed and created pancake-themed games for their buddies in Reception class. In PSHE, they created respect posters showcasing famous people they admire and respect. It's been a week full of creativity, learning, and teamwork!


