

Thank you for helping to keep our community safe.






I CAN BE RESILIENT

Well done Donaldson Class!










WE CAN LIVE RESPECTFULLY - ASSEMBLY THIS WEEK

Mrs Parkin shared that the children came into assembly beautifully on Monday morning looking smart and ready to learn, with only two people needing reminders about tucking shirts in! The children were also very calm and came in silently while listening to some 'Chillstep' which apparently is the type of music listened to by Computer coders while they code!

Our Quality and Expectation value was exemplified this week by the story of Grace Hopper, one of the first computer coders whose motto

in life was 'dare and do'. The children learnt that whatever opportunity came her way, Grace grabbed it with both hands and this meant that she was able to live a happy and fulfilling life as well as an important one - we can look to her for the fact that computers work for everyday people these days, not just for scientists and mathematicians as they did in Grace's day. The children were hopefully inspired by the tale of Grace's life to 'Make it Happen' in their own lives!



The children were also pleased to have earnt their first £20 for the bank of Newchurch for 99% attendance last week. Just to remind everybody that £20 will be deposited into our bank for every week that the school manages to hit it's attendance target of 96%. We know we need a little bit of luck to make this happen but what a fabulous start!



SICKNESS REMINDERS

As a parent you are the best person to know if your child is well enough to come to school and is able to learn. This week school attendance has been hit by a few nasty germs and tummy bugs doing the rounds and so we thought it sensible to remind our community of our school sickness advice.

Should your child wake up with a cough, cold or headache our advice is to give them whatever remedy you would ordinarily use (calpol etc) and send them into school. The only exception

would be if your child has a temperature or fever above 38°.

We will always contact you if your child's condition worsens or if we believe it is contagious such as chicken pox, vomiting etc.

To prevent spread of infection if your child experiences diarrhoea or vomiting we ask that they do not attend school for 24 hours after the last episode, and if your child suffers with both symptoms then we ask that your child remains at home for 48hrs.

The provision operates from 7.45am and enables the children who join in to enjoy their breakfast in a safe, social setting with their peers before school. We also recognise the wider benefits to

our busy families who may not have time to think about breakfast before dashing out to work.


Year 3 and 4 have started their Tag Rugby units, this week we worked on ball familiarity, passing and techniques to evade being tagged.

SO WHAT HAVE WE BEEN LEARNING THIS WEEK?



Donaldson Class have been amazing at coming into school on their own and putting their belongings away. We are so proud of how independent they are! They are starting to learn where everything goes and are trying super hard to look after their classroom and help tidy it up. This week we have been learning Incy Wincy Spider and playing lots of listening games to help us with our sound

discrimination and prepare us for our phonics learning. We have been clapping syllables, spotting rhymes and making up some silly alliterations. We have also been learning some fun facts about spiders. It's been super windy outside this week so we decided to make some kites to fly in our outside area. We also made some deliciously tasty concoctions in the mud kitchen. Worm pies and squashed tomato stew - yummy!

Rosen class has been very busy this week and have continued working on their numbers to ten. They have been counting forwards and back, as well as finding one more and one less. In Literacy we have been looking at We're Going on a Bear Hunt and the children have written some super sentences about where the children walked to find the bear. In Art we have been experimenting with mark making. We have made different patterns and designs by using a variety of colours and lines. In PSHE we have been discussing how we would feel in different situations and whether this would make us feel good or bad.

This week in Zephaniah Class we have continued to read the Three Billy Goats Gruff book in English. We have been using time words to order the events in the story and started to use adjectives and conjunctions in our sentences. We have also been extending all our knowledge in Maths with tens, ones and place value. In Art we began to look at an Artist called Yayoi Kusama who specialises in adding polka dots to all her work, especially to pumpkins. All the children in Zephaniah Class are already very excited to create sculptures of pumpkins at the end of the half term!!

This week in Wharton Class we have been looking at place value in Maths. One of the skills we have looked at is partitioning numbers into 100s, 10s and 1s. In English we have looked at why a contents page is important and have been thinking about prosody in our reading. In Science we have started to look at our topic of Rocks and Soils. In PSHE we have looking at special people in our lives, what makes them special, how we cope if we fall out with them and how we can make things right when they go wrong.

Year 4 have been studying one of Maya Angelou's poems this week called 'Life Doesn't Frighten Me.'
We looked at the rhyming pattern in the poem and also noticed there was a repeating line. We then wrote our



own poems in the same style. In maths, we have been mastering segmenting numbers into their place value headings. We looked at the different ways we can represent a four digit number and also made them using manipulatives. We learned about the different features of a river in geography and played a game where we had to identify the features from the pictures. In computing, we learned the difference between the internet and the world wide web. We also learned that the world wide web contains web pages and web sites and discovered the different features they contain.

Duffy Class have had a productive week, we have been writing and performing our own 'free verse' poems. The whole class are extremely talented at creating poetry and enjoyed being inspired by their class poet Carol Ann Duffy. We have also started looking at our new rich text 'The Midnight Fair' by Gideon Sterer and Mariachiara Di Giorgio. We are exploring the first part of the story, predicting what the book could be about, just from looking at the front cover. We have also been looking at sentence structures, and the appropriate times to use simple, compound and complex sentences within our writing. Next week we are looking at appropriate vocabulary to help write a description. We have started our new History topic 'Did the Beeching Act affect the Isle of Wight Railways?'. We looked at transport through time, organising transport into timelines, then working out what transport there was on the Island in 1889. We then looked at the advantages and disadvantages of each transportation available in 1889. A great start to the second week!



The class have been busy learning lots this week. In Geography, the children have been learning about extreme weathers and where these are likely to take place. Using maps and atlases, we located where the most recent extreme weathers have taken place and noticed that most of them were close to the meeting point of two tectonic plates. We have spent some time this week exploring some grammatical terms (modal verbs, pronouns and relative clauses), and have practiced using them within our writing. In PSHE, the class read a story about "Dan's difficult day". We talked about how sometimes having a positive mindset can have a great impact on your

day and any negative things that may happen. We have tried to implement this into our everyday activities, to help overcome any negative thoughts.
