Can we also remind parents to label all items of clothing that come into school as our lost property bin is already overflowing! If items are named they will return to their owner!






YOUNG GOVERNORS WANT TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

CULTURAL CORNER-A MISSION POSSIBLE FROM MISS BEALE



Celebrating 'El Cinco de Mayo'

Miss Beale has been sharing in her Spanish lessons this week that this Sunday is 'El Cinco de Mayo' -a day of celebration for many Mexicans, as it commemorates an

event which happened on 5th May 1862. At the time, Mexico was suffering from severe economic turmoil and the president defaulted on debt payments to Europe. In response, France, ruled by Napoleon III, invaded Mexico. A large number of French troops were sent to attack Puebla de Los Angeles, a small town in east-central Mexico, in what became the 'Battle of Puebla'. Against all odds, the vastly outnumbered and poorly supplied Mexicans emerged triumphant.

To this day, in the state of Puebla, where the famous battle took place, and other nearby regions, Cinco de Mayo is a day of local pride and patriotic celebration of a spectacular battle victory over one of the most powerful armies in the world. The celebrations in Puebla include re-enactments of the battle, traditional dances and lively parades.

The holiday is also widely celebrated in the United States. People attend parades with colourfully dressed dancers, listen to lively Mexican folk music called mariachi, and eat millions of avocados in traditional dishes such as guacamole. Washington, D.C. even holds the Running of the Chihuahuas, where Chihuahuas (a breed that originated in Mexico) race each other for fun.

If you would like to celebrate with a Mexican inspired meal, why not exemplify our Mission Possibles, 'I can make it happen' and 'I can make healthy choices', and help your child to make this easy Chicken Tacos recipe. This can be made vegetarian, or vegan by swapping Quorn for the chicken, and selecting the vegan options from the suggested toppings.

FOR THE TACOS	TOPPINGS
 3 tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil 4 boneless skinless chicken breasts, cut into	 sour cream thinly sliced red onion diced tomatoes grated cheese diced avocados fresh coriander or parsley,
1" strips salt freshly ground black pepper 2 tsp. chili powder 2 tsp. ground cumin 1/2 tsp. garlic powder 1/4 tsp. paprika 1/4 tsp. cayenne 8 corn tortillas, warmed	lime wedges

<u>Method</u>

1. Heat the oil in a large frying pan, over a medium heat. Season the chicken with salt and pepper and add to the pan. Cook until golden (approximately 6 minutes). Make sure your chicken is cooked all the way through.

- 2. Mix your spices, adding a little oil, to help them coat the chicken, and then add these to your pan.
- 3. Assemble your tacos by layering the chicken and desired toppings in the tortillas. Serve with lime wedges.

SO WHAT HAVE WE BEEN LEARNING THIS WEEK?



This week we have been watching our class caterpillars grow. They are already 1cm bigger than last week and we were able to use our super maths knowledge to recognise that means they've doubled in size! They're also much more wiggly and are crawling all around their home. We've drawn some amazing story maps and written a sentence about The Very Hungry Caterpillar story. In maths, we've been using our super subitising skills and doubles skills to recognise larger groups of numbers. We've also been looking at symmetrical patterns and had a go at creating some of our own.

Miss Barnett has been teaching us to sign the story of the Hungry Caterpillar . Ask us to show you how to sign the days of the week, apple, pear, plum, strawberry, orange, caterpillar, butterfly, cocoon and ate.

This week in year one we have been busy in English learning all the places Emma Jane has visited on her aeroplane and the friends she has made in each location. The children were then set a mission to create their own story maps of Emma Jane's adventures to help with their story recount writing next week, all the children showed brilliant determination and 'can do attitude' to make their maps as detailed as possible, well done! In Maths this week we have been looking at equal groups and what equal means, the children have all been brilliant mathematicians being able to reason and explain their thinking and problem solving skills to solve a

variety of problems. This week in PSHE we looked at how we have changed since being a baby and how much we have already achieved, it was great fun to look back at the changes and milestones we have already crossed and all the future milestones to come.



Shilling class has had a busy week. We have continued to look at the Night Gardener and this week we have been concentrating on subordinate clauses and using apostrophes for possession. In Maths we have been learning about mass, capacity and weight. We have been reading a variety of scales, as well as comparing objects that are lighter or heavier. We have been using kitchen scales to weigh a variety of objects from around the classroom. In Science we have been looking at the difference between seeds and bulbs and thinking about reasons for this. In

Computing we have started to experiment with Chrome Music lab and have been using this to make different patterns and pitches within music. We have continued to look at the work of Henri Rousseau in Art and have looked at the styles and techniques he used. We then tried to emulate this with some of our own artwork.

This week Real Class have been working hard on measuring length and solving problems around this topic. In English we have been using what the witnesses saw in the book, Tuesday, writing it in speech bubbles then putting it into sentences using speech punctuation. In Science, we have been exploring what plants need to grow. In PSHE we have been looking at how to keep ourselves healthy through exercise, food, good hygiene and medicines. We have looked at how infectious illnesses are spread and how we can help to reduce this spreading.

Year 4 have been learning how to find equivalent fractions in maths this week. We used a fraction wall to help us and then noticed patterns and realised that we can multiply the numerator and denominator by the same number to find an equivalent fraction. We then went on to simplify fractions by dividing by a common factor. In Computing this week, we began our unit on photo editing and learned how to crop and rotate photos and how this can affect the composition of the image. We learned about the different types of pollination in science and how many insects pollinate plants purely by accident! In English, we focused on dialogue and took the roles of Vashti and her teacher to practice the conversation they might have had before writing a piece of dialogue between them. We looked at different

joining techniques in art and had a go at some junk modelling to try them out.

Krone Class have been looking at areas this week in maths. We have been calculating areas of rectangles and composite shapes, working out how to split shapes into rectangles and squares, then adding both areas together to calculate the whole shape. We have also been concentrating on problem solving, looking at problems, planning what we need to do and then deciding what strategies to use to solve it. The final steps are to calculate the problem then check that we have the right answer, by doing the inverse. In English we have been looking at different types of sentence structures and how we can change the position of clauses around, to give our writing a different tone. In History, we learnt about Anglo-Saxon and Viking laws and punishments. The Anglo-Saxon punishments were cruel and harsh, compared to the Vikings punishments and some of the ordeals they put defendants under were mind-boggling!



This week, Year 6 have spent a lot of time focusing on their reasoning and problem solving in maths: picking apart each question; working out what we know; and making a plan. The class have benefited from working in groups this week, and it's had such a positive impact on their confidence. In History, the class were told The Story of Eweka. In small groups, they studied a particular part of this story, unpicking the relationships and the impact this had on the Benin period. In PE, the class have enjoyed the start of cricket and athletic season. We've had some great class discussion this week around 'risk', what risks are, how to judge risks and what factors we can put into

place in order to minimise risks we may find ourselves in.
