

THE RNLI CONTINUE TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

This week saw a special anniversary of 200 years of the RNLI being celebrated across the country. This anniversary is especially relevant to Year 1 who are currently studying the life of Grace Darling as their history focus. Grace Darling was a lighthouse keeper's daughter who rescued sailors in distress in her rowing boat and is considered to be the founder of the modern day lifeboat service.

YEARS 2 AND 5 LEARN TO 'MAKE A DIFFERENCE' WITH THE FIRE SAFETY TEAM!

On Wednesday Years 2 & 5 had a fantastic visit from the Hampshire Fire and Rescue Service. The children were shown the most common causes of fire and how they can prevent a fire from breaking out in their home. They were taught the 'Stop, Drop and Roll' rule for if their clothes caught alight and to 'Get out, Stay out and Call 999' in the event of a fire.

They looked at the different types of smoke alarms, heard the noise they made and were told how frequently they should be checked to ensure they work properly.

During the session in Year 5, the class watched an

important video that demonstrated how quickly fire could spread within a room. The children maturely discussed with the instructor their mixed thoughts about putting the fire out themselves but they were surprised to see how advanced the fire had become within 2 minutes (the average amount of time it

would take to get water), those initially in favour of putting it out themselves soon changed their opinions!

Following this, the instructor re-emphasised the importance of the 'Get out, Stay out and Call 999' protocol and taught them to never try to extinguish a fire themselves -

that is a job for the trained professionals!

An incredibly informative session that "made a difference" to everyone's fire safety knowledge.





YEAR 1 LEARN HOW TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE WITH THE RECYCLING TEAM

On Thursday, Year One had a visit from Ella from the waste and recycling centre. Ella shared with the children things that harm our planet and what we can do to make it better, sharing with the class some top tips about how they can dispose of rubbish (using a food bin, recycling bin and general waste bin). Following on from this Ella shared the importance of recycling and protecting our environment from plastic, and how it is harming not only the environment but also causing harm for animals too. The children loved the opportunity to share their class book 'Tidy' and were able to make meaningful links about caring for animals' habitats throughout. To end the session the children got to make their very own recycled sock rabbit and it was a great experience for the children to see how easy recycling a material can be!

KEEPING CHILDREN SAFE—WHAT DO WE MEAN BY SAFEGUARDING?

In school we talk a lot about keeping children safe and staff recognise this as their prime responsibility.

But when we talk about safeguarding what do we actually mean?

The definition of safeguarding was updated in February 2024 and we thought it useful to share with our families so that we continue to work together on these very important common goals:

- * providing help and support to meet the needs of children as soon as problems emerge
- * protecting children from maltreatment, whether that is within or outside the home, including online
- * preventing impairment of children's mental and physical health or development
- * ensuring that children grow up in circumstances consistent with the provision of safe and effective care
- * promoting the upbringing of children with their birth parents, or otherwise their family network through a kinship care arrangement, whenever possible and where this is in the best interests of the children
- * taking action to enable all children to have the best outcomes in line with the outcomes set out in the Children's Social Care National Framework.

In our school the Designated Safeguarding Lead is Miss Howarth, supported by Mrs Parkin, Mrs Kelly and Mrs Martin. If you have any concerns regarding about any element of safeguarding please do not hesitate to make contact with the identified staff who will be able to support you further.

There are also a lot of safeguarding resources signposted on our school website— please do take a look.



Where possible we ask parents to please administer any necessary medication before or after the school day.

If you are unable to do this and your child requires *prescribed medication* in school this *must* be handed into the office on the morning of the first day it is required and a medication form *must* be signed.

This medication must be prescribed by a Doctor and appropriately labelled.

In this season of coughs and sniffles please be mindful that we are unable to administer over the counter remedies such as Calpol/ cough mixture and we will kindly ask that you or a member of your family come to school yourself to administer this to your child should you need it during the school day.

Year 3 Showcase

SO WHAT HAVE WE BEEN UP TO THIS WEEK?



Penny class have been VERY excited about writing letters this week. We wrote some letters to the giant and Mrs Starkey posted them for us. We had lots to tell him and even thought of some questions to ask him. We were delighted when he wrote back and it has inspired us to write even more letters! Letter writing has also challenged us to think about how we can fold the paper so that it can fit into the envelope. We've been learning to write the curly caterpillar letters and are working hard to form c, o and a correctly. In maths we have been looking at the

part part whole model and a 10's frame to show the composition of numbers.

This week in English the children have been busy writing a letter as Pete the Badger, the children have all been super at writing for purpose and have been really focused making sure their letter contains all the correct information. In Maths, we have started our new learning on place value to 50 and have been working on our problem solving skills, as a class we have been working on our independence when facing our daily power up question and it has been great to see the children choose their own concrete resource to support their mathematical thinking. In computing this week the children have been programming a robot to move across and round a square, making sure to not move out of the square's perimeter, the children showed brilliant team work and it was great to see all the children so determined to make it happen! On Thursday we had a visit from Ella who delivered a waste and recycling session, we learnt all about ways we can look after our planet, what materials can be recycled and ended the session making an Easter bunny out of recycled materials!

Shilling class have been working hard this week to complete their recount of Toby and the Great Fire of

London. They have been trying to include some subordinating clauses such as' 'the fire spread quickly when it was blown by the wind.' In Maths the children have shown a super understanding of arrays when using these to solve multiplication questions. In DT they have experimented with different ways of attaching axles, before starting to put together their moving vehicles. They are looking amazing and everyone is looking forward to decorating and testing them next week. In Science we have started

our topic on new plants and will be seeing how our bean seeds develop over the coming week.

This week in Real Class we have started our new topic in maths about measurement. In English we have written our poems to create a class book, we have used the structure of the Magic Box poem, then based this on our book The Night Box. In Science we are looking at states of matter, solids, liquids and gases. This week we have looked at the properties of each state. We then carried out an experiment to find the liquid with the most viscosity. In PSHE we have talked about volunteers and how they help our community.



This week in year 4 we have been getting to grips with division. We looked at the different words or phrases that are used in questions about division and how we can use our times table knowledge to help us. We used concrete apparatus and diagrams to represent different division calculations and showed how we sometimes need to exchange a ten for ten ones. We studied different sources that described the appearance of Boudicca in history and talked about their reliability before drawing our own Boudicca portraits based on the information given. In DT, we conducted some research into torches before looking at different switches and how they work. We then

designed our own switch to control our torch. We focused on dialogue in English and worked out the rules for punctuating direct speech. We also learned how to show character by describing how the character is speaking and what they are doing.

Krone Class has had another busy week. At the beginning of the week, we participated in a 'Protective characteristic' webinar, learning about how everyone has the right to be equal, even if you are different. We also participated in a fire workshop learning about the dangers of fires and how to keep ourselves safe. We looked at how quickly a fire can spread and learnt to get out and call 999. In English, the class has written their own battle scenes, using complex sentences to add tension for the reader. In maths, we have been looking at decimals up to 2 places and then looking for the equivalent fraction to decimal. We looked at problem solving and how we tackle different problems. We worked systematically and made sure we showed all our workings, to help answer the questions. We carried out some more research in D&T, taste testing a range of soups, to help us design our own vegetarian soups. Next week, we will be designing our own soups, thinking about all the new ingredients they have tasted.



As part of their DT learning this week, Year 6 have been researching sugar savvy snacks and tasting some food samples. They'll be using this research to design and create their own snacks over the next few weeks. They have really enjoyed writing this week too, using our key text as their stimulus to create some persuasive letters. The class took part in a webinar on the Protective Characteristics, focusing on the importance of equality and discussing the negative impacts of discrimination.
